INTRODUCTION

Art can act as a tool to address social determinants of health and to communicate public health needs to international policy makers.

'Art for UHC' was a part of, 'Walk the Talk New York City: The Health for All Challenge', a 5K fun run, that took place on September 22, 2019 leading up to the United Nations-High Level Meeting (UN-HLM) on UHC during the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) week. The UN-HLM on UHC advocates mobilization of high-level political attention globally and within communities.



The centralized theme for UHC were '6 Key Asks', a consolidated set of asks by international stakeholders to feed into political declaration for UHC.



METHODS

Art for UHC was displayed and created as a 'Stationary Exhibit' and a 'Live Exhibit' along the running/walking trail on September 22, 2019.
